In the past, the definition of a computer was: "a person who does computations for a living".




But today, unless you live in the Amazon jungle, you use computers of a different sort.

In our modern society, computers are everywhere.




So it is important to be computer literate.

Computer literacy (a.k.a. digital literacy) – a knowledge and understanding of computers and their uses.



What is a computer? What does it do?

- A computer is an electronic device that operates under the control of instructions store in its memory
- O It accepts data, processes the data according to instructions, produces results and stores the results for later use
- O Computers turn raw data into information
